The National Intellectual Property Rights Coordination Center (IPR Center) will observe its 10-year anniversary with an open house celebration this spring at its facility in Arlington, Va.

The event on April 26 will coincide with the annual observance of World IP Day, a day to learn about the role that intellectual property rights such as industrial designs, trademarks, and copyright play in encouraging innovation and creativity.

The event will highlight the many collaborative initiatives coordinated by the Center over the years with its 23 partner agencies, industry representatives and

### 2018 goals and priorities increase focus on IP and trade law enforcement

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) has released its goals and priorities for fiscal year 2018 aimed at securing the homeland from transnational criminal organizations, while fulfilling the requirements of presidential executive orders that include violations of trade and customs laws. ICE HSI Deputy Executive Associate Director Derek Benner detailed HSI's 2018 operational priorities.

"HSI will leverage its expansive authorities, experience and partnerships beyond our borders, at the border, and inside our borders to ensure that criminal organizations are investigated and dismantled," Benner wrote. "HSI will focus on expanding our capacity and expertise to conduct effective trade fraud investigations and expand our global efforts to combat trade



fraud including a coordinated effort utilizing partner law enforcement agencies, international partners, non-government organizations and the legitimate trade community to identify, disrupt and dismantle transnational criminal organizations who exploit global trade systems to further their illicit activities."

Priority programs include anti-dumping and countervailing duty evasion, forced labor, textile and tobacco smuggling, wildlife and environmental crimes, and intellectual property enforcement. All ICE HSI trade fraud programs are housed at the IPR Center and are supported by more than 185 ICE/HSI field offices throughout the United States, and 62 overseas locations in 46 countries. HSI's investigative and enforcement initiatives and operations target cross-border criminal organizations that exploit America's legitimate travel, trade, financial and immigration systems for their illicit purposes.

#### Did You Know...

UL (Underwriters Laboratories) tested 400 counterfeit iPhone adapters; all but three failed basic safety tests and were determined to be fire and shock hazards. According to the UL test results, twelve were so poorly designed and constructed, that they posed a risk of lethal electrocution to the user. ## Officials launch Intellectual Property Law Enforcement Coordinator Network



Christopher Merriam, deputy chief for Intellectual Property at the Department of Justice (DOJ) Computer Crime & Intellectual Property Section addressed the launch of the Intellectual Property Law Enforcement Coordinator (IPLEC) network in Washington, D.C. The network is designed to ensure that experienced U.S. prosecutors are located in high-impact regions to enhance the capacity of individual countries to investigate and prosecute IP crimes, and to develop regional networks to more effectively deter and detect IP crimes. DOJ teamed up with the Department of State to make the announcement.

The program has grown to a network of five prosecutors in Abuja, Nigeria; Bucharest, Romania; São Paulo, Brazil; Bangkok, Thailand; and Hong Kong S.A.R. The DOJ IPLEC network is committed to

working closely with ICE HSI and the U.S. Patent and Trade Office in implementing training programs in these regions.

## Counterfeits and consumer safety tips dominate briefing on Capitol Hill

IPR Center Deputy Director William Ross joined government officials, business professionals, brand owners and intellectual property representatives to brief the Congressional Trademark Caucus.
